It's been 14 months since we redesigned our Wilshire Boulevard Temple Bulletin. The response to the new design, layout and content has been wonderful! While we're glad that the quality of information we're sending is improving, we're also well aware of the amount of paper we send home to you and the amount of money we spend doing it.

As the Director of Communications, it's my job not only to ensure you're informed, but also to manage the Temple's "brand." Our brand isn't just a logo. It's an experience—the experience you get as a Wilshire Boulevard Temple member. Part of that experience includes getting a live voice when you call us. It includes events and services for families

and individuals at our campuses and online. And it includes caring about our environment and how we spend your membership dues.

How'd you get that rash? Sibling rivalry gone wild or guarding our tongues against evil

This month holds four fascinating Torah portions: *Naso*, *B'haalot'cha*, *Shelach* and *Korah* contain the priestly blessings, spies carrying gigantic grapes, the seven-branched menorah, the curse of wandering the desert for 40 years, kvetching on such a large scale that God rebukes us several times, plus the famous bad guy Korach, who's such a rebel that the earth swallows him and his followers.

One intriguing section is a story about slander, gossip and sibling rivalry. Most of us imagine Moses and his siblings, Aaron and Miriam, as the tightly knit family, the Haggadah depicts. *Parashat B'haalot'cha* presents another dimension of their relationships. Miriam and Aaron speak against Moses and the wife he has chosen. They also brag, claiming, "God has also spoken with us!"—implying Moses isn't unique and distinct in the eyes of God. All three siblings are consequently summoned by God to the Tent of Meeting. God rebukes Aaron and Miriam. Moments later,

Miriam is punished with a bout of leprosy. Moses is deeply distressed and begs God to heal her. Perhaps Moses remembers his little sister who protected him in the house of Pharaoh; perhaps he's afraid the Israelites will die of thirst, as Miriam and the well that follows her will no longer provide and protect. His words are so strong that we use them today in healing services and ceremonies, and at the bedside of the gravely ill. "*El na, refa na la* [Oh Lord, heal her]," Moses begs. Nevertheless, Miriam is confined for seven days outside the camp.

Miriam and Moses teach us that our words can be used to inflict harm or to beseech healing. These siblings learn, the hard way, to guard their tongues against evil speech and to trust and respect each other. We realize through their story that life and relationships need to be cherished.

Our team dialogued with elected officials, supporting cutting-edge job training and solutions to the foreclosure crisis. We are working with Transfiguration Catholic Church to initiate new housing for the homeless.

- **OPCC Pantry**

Last September we opened our second food pantry, serving the homeless in Santa Monica.

- **The Big Give**

The 20th anniversary of the Temple

Campus Food Pantry was a Thanksgiving endeavor providing delicious meals to 4,000 Angelenos!

- **Clothing Bins**

Bins at both campuses provide Food on Foot and the National Council of Jewish Women clothing to those in need.

- **Temple Campus Food Pantry**

The pantry now has a part-time nurse to assist clients with free health care.

- **The Darfur Project**

Brawerman sixth graders delivered \$10,000 to B'nai Darfur last month in Tel Aviv—thanks to our congregation's generous *tzedakah*.

- **Consultation on Conscience**

This Washington, DC, conference brought 450 leaders from shuls nationwide, networking and learning from the most important voices in social action today. Five of our congregants came home with new ideas to enhance our efforts.

- **Big Sunday**

Vinny Green, her sons David and Daniel, and the fantastic CLE staff created an extravaganza of *tikkun olam* at both campuses and on Skid Row, where LA Central City Community Church received an “extreme makeover”! Vinny, thank you beyond words for all you are and all you do.

Tani Isaacs, chair of the Tikkun Olam Committee, worked tirelessly with staff and congregants; I know she and the committee will not rest on their laurels, but continue to raise the bar and help us to help more.

Every summer, I sit outside wearing a big sombrero and catch up on my reading. Let me share some of the titles on my list, and maybe you'll be inspired to open the pages of a great summer read yourself!

Built by Angels: The Story of the Old-New Synagogue

by Mark Podwal

Legends describe Prague's "Alt-Neu" Synagogue as having been built by angels but inhabited by a golem, a lost soul who remains there to this day. Despite storms, plagues, the Nazi invasion and Communism, it remains an active congregation. Podwal captures the myth through words as well as colorful illustrations.

Why Faith Matters by David Wolpe

When a theologian moves beyond the theoretical, I'm interested. Wolpe, rabbi of our neighbor, Sinai Temple, not only argues for faith in his response to the current wave of atheism and his exploration of our literary tradition, but also reveals his personal faith and prayer as he struggled with cancer.

Jewish Meditation: A Practical Guide by Aryeh Kaplan

Many books have been written on meditation, but this summer I hope to return to Kaplan's book. Rodger Kamenetz, author of *The Jew in the Lotus*, writes: "It is a gentle, clear introduction and provides exercises and practices that can be used right away by one who wants a deeper prayer experience." I agree—and appreciate his assertion that meditation is deeply grounded in Jewish tradition.

Songs for a Butcher's Daughter by Peter Manseau

This first novel by Manseau won the \$10,000 John Sargent Sr. First Novel Prize and the Jewish Book Award for 2009. It raises the question: What makes a Jewish book—the content of the story or the author? Manseau is a devout Catholic whose experience as a collector of Yiddish books evolved into this Jewish novel of immigration and transition, love and tears. Happy summer reading!

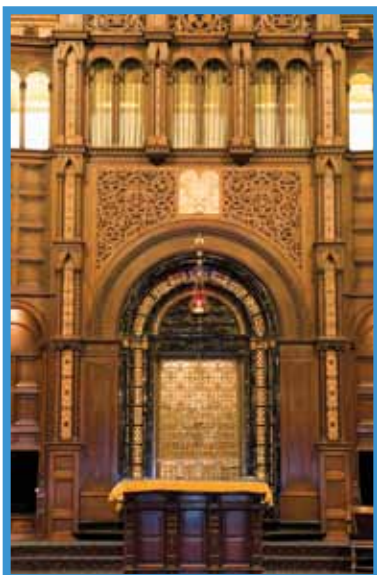

SANCTUARY CELEBRATES ITS 80TH BIRTHDAY THIS SUMMER



Eighty years ago, on June 7, 1929, Congregation B'nai Brith dedicated its magnificent new sanctuary, and reintroduced itself as Wilshire Boulevard Temple. Over three days, a series of public ceremonies drew L.A.'s leading public officials and clergy from the major Christian denominations to celebrate the opening of the congregation's third house of worship. Local newspaper headlines described the "Hebrew

church" as the most impressive in the city.

Six years earlier, the women of the congregation had met over lunch at Hillcrest Country Club to plan the purchase of a plot of land on Wilshire Boulevard. At the time, Wilshire Boulevard was developing as the "Fifth Avenue of the West," the grand concourse of the City of Angels, an exciting new development by Gaylord Wilshire that extended the city's boundaries with elegant apartment houses, stately homes and lushly landscaped parks.

But in reality, Los Angeles was still pretty much a small town, and the grand concourse became a dirt road when it stretched past Western Avenue, the western border of the city. Beverly Hills was still largely orange groves, and the vast tracts of the San Fernando Valley were agricultural acreage, decades away from postwar subdivision.

By 1929, however, Congregation B'nai Brith was a well-established local institution, having received its charter in 1862 during the Civil War. Edgar Magnin, its rabbi, was building a formidable reputation as an agent of Christian-Jewish understanding. In grandiloquent language, Magnin described the new building in a commemorative journal for the dedication: "This is more than a work of art. Imprisoned in wood, stone, marble and canvas are the loyalty and faith of a great congregation. The souls of your loved ones...and your own as well, will live on in these walls, long after we have mingled with the dust."

The commemorative journal listed all 2,200 member families of the congregation at that time, all of whom had given what they could to support the building project's enormous price tag of \$1.4 million. Among the membership roster were the names of the early movie moguls—the Warner brothers, Irving Thalberg, Carl Laemmle and Louis B. Mayer—and business leaders like Tom May (May Department Stores Company), Isaac O. Levy (Behrendt-Levy Insurance Co.) and the heirs of Herman Hellman (Hellman, Haas & Co.).

Today, those historic names are associated with the golden age of the movie studios and the transformation of Los Angeles from west-coast outpost to world capital. And while Wilshire Boulevard Temple has also assumed a prominent place in the history books, it continues to be a thriving, relevant and vibrant modern-day institution.



As we celebrate the 80th anniversary of the sanctuary's dedication, we are once again looking to the future as we envision our Temple in the 21st century. Our congregation's clergy and leadership have always been forward thinking. The vision, courage, generosity and commitment that created the "most magnificent of edifices" are no less in evidence today than they were eight decades ago.
