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Former U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger said, “The security of Israel is a moral imperative for all free peoples.” Many nations understand this core belief. Just walk along the seashore in Tel Aviv and hear the singsong of Hebrew, Ladino, Spanish, Arabic, Amharic, Russian and Indian spoken in shops and cafes.

Turn eastward and you’ll see not only the exquisite resorts, but also the explosion of investment in clean technology. At a lab in Rehovot, for example, Dov Raviv—the man who developed the Arrow missile—is consumed with his next mission: making Israel energy independent by using cheap solar power.

Turn eastward and see dance, theater, comedy and film developing throughout this dynamic society. Even Israeli wines are

winning praise. Last spring, *Wine Spectator* secretly visited several wineries and sampled some of the country’s best wines; this year, three Israeli wines scored an impressive 92 out of 100.

Turn eastward and experience Shabbat in Jerusalem. The warm desert wind pushes and pulls the pines and the palms, the sun sets and the quiet of Shabbat envelops you. Soak it in...be embraced by it.

Noah's Ark
and Jewish DNA



I'll never forget studying Noah in rabbinic school. I thought we'd explore the morality of God wiping out almost all of humanity, or what kinds of evil deeds caused this cataclysm—boy, was I wrong! Instead, we read this story “checking our faith at the door,” examining each verse on its own merit as well as in the context of the whole narrative. I never could have predicted what we discovered—and how emblematic it is of who we are as Reform Jews.

The story is well-known: Noah is commanded to build the ark and load it up with animals. However, in one verse he's supposed to take “of all that lives, two of each” (6:19), but just a few verses later, “of every clean animal you shall take seven pairs” (7:2). Hmm...one pair or seven pairs? If that isn't confusing enough, in one verse Noah and his brood are floating on the water for 40 days, and in another they're on a 150-day journey. Which is it?

What's relevant is not which version is “right,” but that we have two separate stories, wound together like DNA.

Noah's Ark and Jewish DNA

NOACH, GENESIS 6:9 - 11:32

Our ancient authors believed these two stand-alone Noah narratives were best entwined, wrapped around each other in an eternal literary dance. What's important is that we see how, thousands of years before our modern Reform Jewish movement was born, our ancestors valued diversity so deeply that they enfolded it inextricably into one of the core stories of our tradition. Like the Noah stories, we too are bound as a congregation to each other, to our different practices and, according to Talmud, to all our people, for *col Yisrael areivim zeh ba'zeh*: All Jews are responsible, one for the other.

are *invited* into the heart of the Wilshire Boulevard Temple community. This changes and heightens the experience of Friday evening worship. Our sense of community is even richer when we linger and share the post-service moments of Shabbat with fellow congregants and family members.

In short, enjoy Shabbat with an open heart! As the old commercial said, “Try it! You'll like it!”

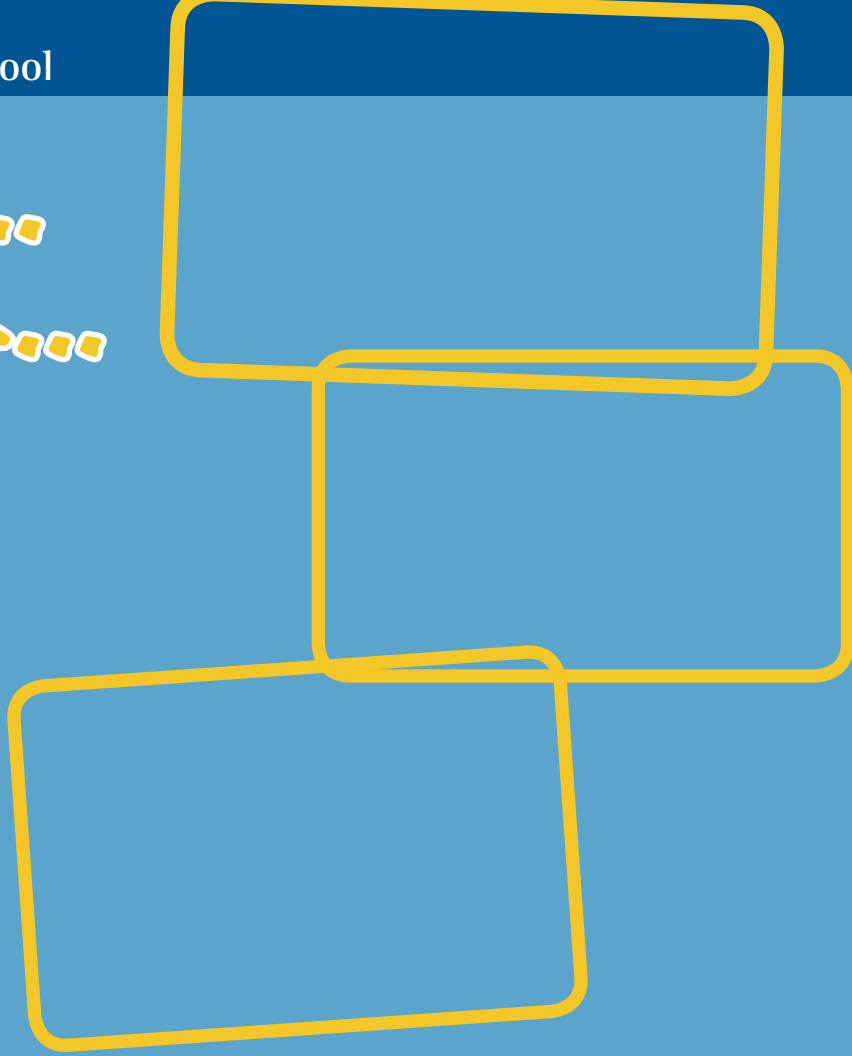


Give me a B... give me an L...

The *Ba'machaneh* families experienced this joy during our PACE (Parent and Child Education) program at Camp Hess Kramer. We began our day with *t'filah* (services) outside under a beautiful blue sky. Surrounded by nature, we put our arms around each other and sang "*Hinei Mah Tov*," enjoying sitting with one another and being together.

While the children worked on their Hebrew in games like Hebrew Twister,

Hebrew hopscotch and life-size Hebrew Memory, Vinny Green and I sat with the parents to discuss our program, including the new curriculum and the way we teach Hebrew, and addressed their questions and concerns. We asked why they chose this program and what they would like their children to experience. We acknowledged that by working together, we could better achieve our goal of providing a meaningful and enjoyable learning experience at camp for our *Ba'machaneh* participants.

After a picnic lunch and song session on Breuer Lawn, we participated in "The Great God Hunt." Families and teach-

ers looked for God around camp, took pictures of things in which they saw God, read stories together, discussed how they related to the families' search for God and created "Road Maps to God," reflecting each family's ongoing search for God at home.

We then put our arms around each other and sang "*Hinei Mah Tov*" once again, reiterating how truly good and pleasant it was to be together.
